Mayor Grim read the Proclamation and and it was entered into the public record.

1. Oath of Office given to Cumberland Police Officers Bronson Becker, Jr., James Beck, III, Ashley Davis, Michael Bise, Brandon Liller, and Jeffrey Fairley

Chief Charles Hinnant introduced each officer, provided background information on the officer, and introduced family members who were in attendance. Mayor Grim swore the police officers into office and welcomed them as members of the Cumberland Police Department.

VIII. Director's Reports

(A) Public Works

1. Utilities-Flood/Water/Sewer monthly report for October, 2018

Motion to approve the report was made by Caporale, seconded by Bernard, and was passed on a vote of 5-0.

2. Maintenance Division monthly report for October, 2018

Motion to approve the report was made by Caporale, seconded by Bernard, and was passed on a vote of 5-0.

(B) Police

1. Police Department monthly report for October, 2018

Motion to approve the report was made by Caporale, seconded by Bernard, and was passed on a vote of 5-0.

IX. New Business

(A) Ordinances

1. Ordinance (*1st reading*) - providing for the closure of a portion of Pear Street running from the south side of Henderson Avenue South for a length of 125 feet in the direction of N. Centre Street, as requested by CSX Transportation, Inc.

Mr. Rhodes discussed that the public right of way proposed to be closed was actually a railroad crossing at Pear Street and had been closed a year and a half ago by CSX. This procedure was a formality to officially close the right of way.

FIRST READING: The Ordinance was presented in title only for its first reading. Motion to approve the first reading and table until the following meeting was made by Caporale, seconded by Bernard, and passed on a vote of 5-0.

2. Ordinance (*1st reading*) - providing for the closure of a portion of Second Street, running from the western right of way line of Somerville Avenue West to the eastern right of way line of Memorial Avenue, as requested by the Housing Authority for the City of Cumberland

Mr. Cohen requested that this Ordinance be tabled at this time.

Motion to table the Ordinance was made by Cioni, seconded by Frazier, and was passed on a vote of 5-0.

(B) Resolutions

1. Resolution adopting the 2018 Allegany County Hazard Mitigation Plan as the City of Cumberland 2018 Hazard Mitigation Plan

Mr. Rhodes discussed that the Resolution was a formality used to adopt the County's Hazard Mitigation Plan as the City's Plan.

The Resolution was presented in title only. Motion to approve the Resolution was made by Caporale, seconded by Bernard, and was passed on a vote of 5-0.

Chief Hinnant discussed that this policy expands the take home vehicle privilege to include County residents that are police officers, with a certain hierarchy for assignment. The changes are expected to help with officer recruitment and retention, will extend the life of the vehicles, and will provide incentive for officers to participate in specialized units.

Kelly Robertson, 410 Fayette Street, talked about her family's history in arriving in Cumberland and establishing the Union Laundry on Seymour Street and discussed her efforts to have the building placed on the Historic Registry.

Mayor Grim congratulated Councilmen Cioni and Bernard on being re-elected to Council and also congratulated Raymond Morriss, who had been elected as Mayor.

Mayor Grim also congratulated Councilman Caporale on his election to the Board of County Commissioners and expressed that he was looking forward to Caporale's leadership on that Board. Mayor Grim then presented Councilman Caporale with artwork of the downtown in appreciation for his dedicated service to the citizens of Cumberland.

Councilman Caporale thanked the citizens and his family for their support over the years and likewise thanked Mayor Grim, the Council Members, and City staff for their service to the community. He also congratulated Mayor-Elect Morris and welcomed him to the City Council.

Councilman Bernard announced that with Councilman Caporale's resignation from Council being effective November 20, 2019, the process to fill that vacant seat would now proceed. Applications from interested citizens would be accepted through December 7th. Interviews would be conducted and it was anticipated to have the new council members sworn-in in January.

Council Members Seth Bernard, David Caporale, Richard Cioni, and Eugene Frazier;



ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF CUMBERLAND, MARYLAND, ENTITLED “AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CLOSURE OF A PORTION OF A STREET KNOWN AS PEAR STREET, RUNNING FROM THE SOUTH SIDE OF HENDERSON AVENUE SOUTH FOR A LENGTH OF 125 FEET ON THE EASTERN BOUNDARY OF PEAR STREET AND 125.5 FEET ON THE WESTERN BOUNDARY OF PEAR STREET, THE PORTION OF THE STREET BEING CLOSED LYING ON BOTH SIDES BETWEEN THE LANDS OWNED BY CSX TRANSPORTATION, INC. (AS DESCRIBED IN THE DEED RECORDED AMONG THE LAND RECORDS OF ALLEGANY COUNTY, MARYLAND IN DEED LIBER 1, FOLIO 605), THE PORTION OF SAID STREET BEING CLOSED BEING LOCATED IN THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND, MARYLAND.”

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland received a petition from CSX Transportation, Inc., as required by the terms of Section 11.1 of the Construction Agreement between the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland and CSX Transportation, Inc. dated December 1, 2015, requesting the closure of the portion of Pear Street generally described in the titling of this Ordinance;

WHEREAS, the City Clerk served a personal notice in writing upon each property owner to be affected by the passage of the proposed Ordinance more than ten (10) days before December 4, 2018;

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland, the public welfare and convenience require that the aforesaid portion of the aforesaid street be closed; and

WHEREAS, in that CSX Transportation, Inc. owns the parcels of property adjacent to each side of the portion of Pear Street being closed by this Ordinance, the entire portion of Pear Street being closed shall be conveyed to it.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF CUMBERLAND AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: The portion of the Pear Street described in the metes and bounds description attached hereto as Exhibit A and as shown on the plat attached hereto as Exhibit B is closed. The said closure is subject to the reservation/granting of a perpetual easement in favor of the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland for the full length and width of the portion of Pear Street being closed by this Ordinance for the purpose of ingress, egress, construction, maintenance, operation, alteration, replacement and removal of existing and future utilities. The language describing the aforesaid easement and restrictions and other matters is set forth in the Exhibit C attached hereto. Said language shall be incorporated into the deed effecting the conveyance of the portion of Pear Street closed by this Ordinance to CSX Transportation, Inc.

SECTION 2: The said Mayor and City Council of Cumberland shall ascertain whether any and what amount in value of damage shall be caused by the aforesaid closure for which the owners or possessors of any property located along Pear Street, or portions thereof, should be compensated, and shall assess and levy generally on the property of the persons benefitted by the closure of the street the whole or any part of the expense which shall be incurred in closing the same.

SECTION 3: The City Administrator or his designee shall, within fifteen (15) days of the passage of this Ordinance, submit a report to the City Clerk setting forth his findings regarding what amount of damages shall have been caused by the aforesaid closure of the portion of Pear Street described herein, and the names of the owners or possessors of such property along which said streets now pass, and the amount of damages for which they shall be compensated or benefits for which they shall be assessed, and whether said damages arising from the closure shall be assessed generally on the whole assessable property within the City of Cumberland or specially on the property of the person benefitted by the closure; and, in the event of any of said damages being assessed and levied in whole or in part on any property of the persons benefitted, the names of the owners of the property specially benefitted, with a description of said property by reference to the Land Records of Allegany County, and the amount so levied and assessed. The Mayor and City Council shall consider the matter of the City Administrator's/designee' report and shall make determinations regarding the subject matter of the said report at a meeting held no sooner than fifteen (15) days after the date of the passage of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: Any person feeling aggrieved or injured by the decision of said Mayor and City Council of Cumberland regarding the subject matter of the aforereferenced report shall have the right of an appeal to the Circuit Court at a trial by jury, as provided in Section 128 of the Charter of the City of Cumberland (1991 Edition), upon filing a written notice of appeal with the City Clerk within thirty (30) days after the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland shall have made their return.

SECTION 5: The benefits assessed by said Mayor and City Council of Cumberland shall be liens upon the property of the persons benefitted to the extent of such assessment, and shall be payable within sixty (60) days after the date of the meeting at which the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland makes its determinations regarding the subject matter set forth in the City Administrator's report, and the collection of the same shall be enforced by *scire facias* in the same manner as paving liens are collected by the Mayor and City Council; and a written record of the said Mayor and City Council's determinations shall be filed for record and reported in the Mechanics' Lien Record in the Clerk's Office in the Circuit Court for Allegany County, and the assessment therein shall be liens upon the properties respectively assessed from the time of such recording, such recording to be effected no sooner than the expiration of the aforesaid sixty (60) day period.

SECTION 6: Upon the collection of all benefits assessed and the payment of the damages ascertained, or the waiver of this provision by the parties interested, if applicable the said portion of Pear Street particularly described in Section 1 hereof shall be closed and the Mayor shall be empowered to execute a deed effecting the conveyance of the property described in Exhibit A to CSX Transportation, Inc.

SECTION 7: This Ordinance shall take effect from the date of its passage.

EXHIBIT A

ALL that land, a portion of Pear Street (formerly Pear Alley) located between Henderson Avenue (formerly Maddison Street) and North Centre Street situate in Cumberland, Allegheny County, Maryland more particularly described as follows;

BEGINNING at the intersection of the southerly limit of said Henderson Avenue with the westerly limit of said Pear Street being the most easterly corner of Lot 53 of Beall's First Addition to the Town of Cumberland as shown on the Copy of the Map of the City of Cumberland recorded in Plat Case Box 37 (MSA-S1531-190 also MSA-C1741-2367) dated 1806 also being the eastern most corner of the seventh parcel described in an instrument between Samuel M. Seemes et al and The Maryland and New York Iron & Coal Company (MNYICC), recorded April 4, 1846 in Liber H.B. No. 1, Folio 605 in the Allegany County Circuit Court, Allegheny County, Maryland



SUBJECT, HOWEVER, to an easement in favor of the party of the first part for the full length and width of the right-of-way being closed for any existing utility lines, for stormwater and surface drainage and for the installation, inspection, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement and/or relocation of any needed utility lines and stormwater management and sediment and erosion control devices and improvements (collectively, hereinafter referred to as “utilities”).

FURTHERMORE, it is a condition of the conveyance effected by this deed that the party of the second part, its successors, and assigns, shall be allowed to use the surface of the land hereby conveyed; however, it shall not be permitted to place or erect structures or enclosures thereon without the written consent of the party of the first part, which consent may be granted or denied for any reason or no reason at all. The party of the second part’s use of the property conveyed by this deed shall not interfere with the ingress, egress or other actions of the party of the first part as necessary for the installation, inspection, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement and/or relocation of the utilities and appurtenances and improvements related thereto. Furthermore, no such structures or enclosures shall be located or constructed upon the land conveyed by this deed until plans therefore have been submitted to and approved by the party of the first part’s Engineering Division, and no work in the construction of such structures or enclosures or in the use of the surface shall injure or disturb the aforesaid utilities and improvements related thereto or in any way interfere with or adversely impact their operation or maintenance.

FURTHERMORE, the party of the second part shall not be permitted to grade the property conveyed under the terms of this deed nor shall it be permitted to alter the surface of the land hereby conveyed, except upon the written consent of the party of the first part, said consent not to be unreasonably withheld.

FURTHERMORE, in the event the party of the second part alters the surface of the land hereby conveyed or the subsurface thereof and said alterations result in the need to relocate utility lines and/or other appurtenances or improvements related thereto, the party of the second part shall be liable for all costs associated with the relocation.

FURTHERMORE, the party of the first part shall also have the right to enter upon the property hereby conveyed from time to time to remove, where necessary, such trees and other growths as may be required for the installation, inspection, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement and/or relocation of the aforesaid utility lines and stormwater management and sediment and erosion control devices and improvements related to the foregoing.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD, that the foregoing easements, covenants and restrictions shall be deemed to touch and concern the land, shall run with the title to the land, shall inure to the benefit of the party of the first part and the other parties thereby benefited, and shall be binding upon the party of the second part and all future owners or possessors of all or any of the land hereby conveyed as well as their personal representatives, heirs, successors and assigns, and any and all persons and entities claiming through them.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF CUMBERLAND, MARYLAND, ENTITLED “AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CLOSURE OF A PORTION OF A STREET KNOWN AS SECOND STREET, RUNNING FROM THE WESTERN RIGHT OF WAY LINE OF SOMERVILLE AVENUE WEST (APPROXIMATELY 499 FEET ON THE NORTHERN SIDE OF SECOND STREET AND 495 FEET ON ITS SOUTHERN SIDE) TO THE EASTERN RIGHT OF WAY LINE OF MEMORIAL AVENUE, THE PORTION OF THE STREET BEING CLOSED LYING ON BOTH SIDES BETWEEN THE LANDS OWNED BY THE HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND, THE PORTION OF SAID STREET BEING CLOSED BEING LOCATED IN THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND, MARYLAND.”

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of Cumberland received a petition from the Housing Authority of the City of Cumberland, requesting the closure of the portion of Second Street generally described in the titling of this Ordinance;

WHEREAS, the City Clerk served a personal notice in writing upon each property owner to be affected by the passage of the proposed Ordinance more than ten (10) days before December 4, 2018;

ALL that portion of Second Street situated between Somerville Avenue and Memorial Avenue in the City of Cumberland, Election District No. 4, Allegany County, Maryland, and being more particularly described as follows (Maryland State Plane Meridian courses and horizontal measurements being used thru out) to wit:

BEGINNING for the same at a point in the westerly right of way margin of Somerville Avenue, thence leaving the lines of said avenue and running with the southerly right of way margin of Second Street;

1. North 73 degrees 41 minutes 17 seconds West, 494.62 feet to a point in the easterly margin of a Memorial Avenue, thence crossing Second Street and running with Memorial Avenue;
2. North 16 degrees 17 minutes 53 seconds East, 40.00 feet to a point in the northerly right of way margin of Second Street, thence with a line thereof;

South 21 degrees 55 minutes 50 seconds West, 40.19 feet to the place of beginning, containing 0.456 acres, more or less, all of which is shown on "Plan Of Survey" Prepared For Housing Authority of the City of Cumberland, dated October 22, 2018, and intended to be recorded among the Plat Records of Allegany County, Maryland.

ALL OF THE ABOVE described parcel being part of the same property known as Second Street in the City of Cumberland, Maryland.

TOGETHER WITH AND SUBJECT TO any restrictions, reservations, covenants, right of ways, et cetera as of record.

EXHIBIT C

SUBJECT, HOWEVER, to an easement in favor of the party of the first part and public and private utilities, including, but not limited to, gas, electric and telephone service providers, for the full length and width of the right-of-way being closed for any existing utility lines, for stormwater and surface drainage and for the installation, inspection, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement and/or relocation of any needed utility lines and stormwater management and sediment and erosion control devices and improvements (collectively, hereinafter referred to as “utilities”).

FURTHERMORE, it is a condition of the conveyance effected by this deed that the party of the second part, its successors, and assigns, shall be allowed to use the surface of the land hereby conveyed; however, it shall not be permitted to place or erect structures or enclosures thereon without the written consent of the party of the first part, which consent may be granted or denied for any reason or no reason at all. The party of the second part’s use of the property conveyed by this deed shall not interfere with the ingress, egress or other actions of the party of the first part and public and private utilities as necessary for the installation, inspection, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement and/or relocation of the utilities and appurtenances and improvements related thereto. Furthermore, no such structures or enclosures shall be located or constructed upon the land conveyed by this deed until plans therefore have been submitted to and approved by the party of the first part’s Engineering Division, and no work in the construction of such structures or enclosures or in the use of the surface shall injure or disturb the aforesaid utilities and improvements related thereto or in any way interfere with or adversely impact their operation or maintenance.

FURTHERMORE, the party of the second part shall not be permitted to grade the property conveyed under the terms of this deed nor shall it be permitted to alter the surface of the land hereby conveyed, except upon the written consent of the party of the first part, said consent not to be unreasonably withheld.

FURTHERMORE, in the event the party of the second part alters the surface of the land hereby conveyed or the subsurface thereof and said alterations result in the need to relocate public or private utilities’ lines and/or other appurtenances or improvements

related thereto, the party of the second part shall be liable for all costs associated with the relocation.

FURTHERMORE, the party of the first part and public and private utilities shall also have the right to enter upon the property hereby conveyed from time to time to remove, where necessary, such trees and other growths as may be required for the installation, inspection, operation, maintenance, repair, replacement and/or relocation of the aforesaid utility lines and stormwater management and sediment and erosion control devices and improvements related to the foregoing.

FURTHERMORE, the parties covenant and agree that: (i) The property hereby conveyed shall continue to be surfaced and used as a roadway, albeit a roadway in the private ownership of the party of the second part; (ii) The party of the second part shall be responsible for repairing and maintaining the said roadway in accordance with City of Cumberland standards applicable to City-owned streets; (iii) Any modifications to the roadway, other than the filling of potholes, will require the approval of the City Fire and Police Departments as well as the City Engineer; (iv) Public safety vehicles shall have the right to traverse across the property hereby conveyed at all times and for all purposes; (v) No fencing or obstructions blocking access to or usage of the property hereby conveyed by public safety vehicles shall be permitted; and (vi) The party of the second will place signage on the property hereby conveyed for the purpose of notifying the public that it is private property owned by the party of the second part.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED, that the foregoing easements, covenants and restrictions shall be deemed to touch and concern the land, shall run with the title to the land, shall inure to the benefit of the party of the first part and the other parties thereby benefited, and shall be binding upon the party of the second part and all future owners or possessors of all or any of the land hereby conveyed as well as their personal representatives, heirs, successors and assigns, and any and all persons and entities claiming through them.

Per our telephone discussion, we are pleased to submit herein our proposal to provide engineering services to conduct an alternative study to replace Bridge No. A-C-08 on Fayette Street over CSXT Railroad.

Description:

Bridge No. A-C-08 is a single-span, 45'-6" long steel through girder bridge. The bridge was built in 1885 and was rehabilitated in 2005. The superstructure carrying vehicular traffic consists of three steel through-girders with eleven steel floor beams supporting a timber deck with an asphalt wearing surface. The clear roadway width is 11'-0" for each of the two lanes on the bridge. The timber sidewalks on both sides of the bridge are supported by additional through-girders at the bridge fascia and a floor system comprised of steel floor beams and timber stringers. The sidewalks are each 12'-0" wide. The overall existing bridge width is approximately 51'-0" wide. The substructure consists of two stone masonry and concrete abutments with wingwalls. In addition, steel columns near both ends of the abutments support the sidewalk fascia girders. There is no traffic barrier along the approach roadways. The bridge is currently closed due to being struck by a train. Prior to the train collision, the last inspection of the structure noted it was in overall fair condition and was posted at 21,000 lbs for Single Unit Vehicles and 27,000 lbs for Combination Vehicles. Bridge A-C-08 was being inspected on a 1-year cycle at the time of the train collision. The last recorded BSR of this structure was 28.9 and the bridge is classified as Structurally Deficient. The clearance between the bridge superstructure and the railroad tracks beneath the structure is approximately 18'-7" according to the bridge inspection report.

In discussions with Mr. Smith, it was decided a 21'-9" vertical clearance (between the CSXT tracks and the underside of the structure) is to be considered for the replacement structure. The proposed bridge width will be reduced to a 38'-10" width. This will include a clear roadway width of 24'-10" as requested by the City of Cumberland (assumed two 10'-0" lanes with 2'-5" shoulders, 2'-0" wide concrete parapets, and a 5'-0" wide sidewalk on each side of the bridge.

Services to be Provided by The Wilson T. Ballard Company

1. Review existing as-built plans and current bridge condition inspection report.
2. Perform topographic survey of roadway.
3. Locate front property corners along Fayette Street.
4. Perform a preliminary structural analysis to investigate superstructure replacement alternatives and to determine if the substructure should be rehabilitated or replaced. The superstructure replacement alternatives will include a steel and a prestressed concrete alternative.
5. Determine if retaining walls are needed on adjacent properties.
6. Review existing grade and develop a roadway profile to accommodate a 21'-9" clearance above the CSXT tracks.
7. Perform an AASHTO review and identify any design exceptions needed.
8. Perform quantity takeoffs for major construction items.
9. Review current bid tabulations to determine unit costs.
10. Prepare engineer's cost estimate for all alternatives presented.
11. Prepare a letter report describing the alternatives investigated with recommendations.

1. Plans of existing bridge.
2. Deed research and provide deed mosaic.
3. Survey control points and on-site survey control.

CUMBERLAND POLICE DEPARTMENT

Take Home Vehicle (THV) Program

- 1) **Purpose:** To establish policy, procedures, and guidelines for availability and operation of Take Home Vehicles (THV) to sworn eligible officers for on-duty and off-duty use.
- 2) **Policy:** It shall be the policy of the Cumberland Police Department (CPD) to assign a Take Home Vehicle (THV) to eligible sworn officers for on-duty and off-duty use. Officers will recognize the additional responsibility that accompanies the off-duty operation of a police vehicle, including an expectation by citizens of assistance from the operator of the vehicle.
- 3) **Program Goals:**
 - A. The Take Home Vehicle program is intended to:
 - 1. Raise community safety through increased police presence and visibility in the City of Cumberland, to be accomplished by providing greater incentive for police officers to live in the City as members of the community.
 - 2. Improve officer retention and enhance the department's recruiting posture by offering this incentive which has substantial value to participants.
 - 3. Provide incentive to serve in Administrative and on-call positions (i.e. investigations, ~~and K-9, CERT, Crime Scene Technician, Vehicle Crash Reconstructionists, Crisis Negotiator, Clandestine Lab Team, etc.~~) and to provide adequate equipment, transportation and communications capability on a 24-hour basis.
 - 4. Reduce maintenance costs for the department's fleet and extend the life of each vehicle.
 - 5. Administration, Supervisors and officers will be more informed concerning police activity as a result of monitoring radios and scanners when in their THV.
 - 5-6. Improved officer response time when responding to emergency call outs.

4) Eligibility Requirements and Allocations:

- A. To become eligible for a Take Home Vehicle, an officer must meet the following requirements.
 - 1. The officer has successfully completed the required employment probationary period.
 - 2. The officers must be a resident of the City of Cumberland with the below exception:
 - a. The officer is assigned to a specialized unit that involves callouts and/or county-wide jurisdiction and the officer resides outside the city, but within Allegany County. An officer who lives outside the County and is assigned to a specialized unit or is subject to callout may only take the vehicle home when he/she is actually listed on call.
 - b. K-9 handlers transporting city-owned K-9 dogs are permitted to take their assigned police vehicle home if they reside within twenty-five (25) miles of Cumberland Police Headquarters.
 - c. Should a sufficient number of vehicles be available to satisfy the requirements of 4.A.2.a. & b. vehicles may be assigned to officers who are Allegany County residents residing outside the city as per Cumberland Police Department policy.
- B. Vehicles will be allocated to the THV Program based on availability of vehicles and the operational needs of the department. Departmental operational needs take precedence over the THV Program. Eligibility lists will be established and maintained to govern the order of assignment to eligible officers. The eligibility list will be maintained by the Operations Commander. Assignment of vehicles will be made by the Chief of Police consistent with department policy. by seniority as follows except as assigned to fill the needs of officers in special units.
 - 1. ~~Rank~~
 - 2. ~~Date of rank, and~~
 - 3. ~~Date of hire~~

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- 5) Program Regulations:** The following regulations apply to all participating officers as well as those officers who may be assigned vehicles temporarily under special circumstances by appropriate command authority.
- A. A THV may be used off-duty within Allegany County.
 - B. If an officer, who is an ~~Cumberland-Allegany County~~ resident, and not assigned ~~full-time~~ to a ~~specialized~~ unit, is assigned a Take Home Vehicle, that vehicle shall not be taken outside the confines of Allegany County without the permission of the Chief of Police.
 - C. While off-duty, officers are allowed to transport civilian passengers. The operating officer will use a seat belt and ensure any passengers will use restraining devices. The officer is responsible for the conduct of passengers.
 - D. Any vehicular accident involving a THV will be reported to the Department as well as to the jurisdictional agency in which the accident occurred.
 - E. Any personal injury incurred by a department member or passenger while in a THV will be reported to the Department using the appropriate reporting criteria.
 - F. City vehicles will not be operated after the ingestion of any amount of alcohol, nor by any officer who has ingested any drug that impairs the ability to operate the vehicle.
 - 1. No alcoholic beverages will be transported in a city vehicle except those beverages seized as evidence or contraband.
 - 2. The THV will not be used to frequent an alcoholic beverages store, bar, or similar establishments. Officers will always be cognizant of the image displayed to members of the public.
 - G. Officers who have current, approved secondary employment requests on file with the department are not authorized to use the THV as part of that employment.
 - H. While operating a THV, officers will have on their person, police credentials and badge. In addition, an approved firearm, handcuffs, and portable radio will be available in the vehicle.
 - I. Clothing and attire must be such that it projects a favorable image of the department and does not create a safety hazard for the officer. No shorts, tank tops, sandals or clothing with sexually suggestive wording or depictions or alcohol advertisements, etc. will be worn.
 - J. An unattended THV will be kept locked at all times. The portable radio and all weapons will be removed from the THV when it is unattended except for a short period of time.
 - K. A THV will be turned in to the Operations Commander if the officer is on light duty, extended sick leave, disability, administrative leave, suspension or is the subject of a criminal investigation.
 - L. No unauthorized person is permitted to operate a city vehicle except in a life-threatening emergency.
 - M. Officers are prohibited from using their THV while engaged in ~~any~~ political activities.
 - N. If an off-duty officer, while operating a THV and not involved in an enforcement activity, is involved in a motor vehicle accident which results in property damage or personal injury, and that officer is found to be negligent in his actions, the officer may be responsible for paying the City's fleet insurance deductible. The officer also may be suspended or terminated from the THV program.

6) Operating Procedure:

- A. While using the THV off-duty, each officer will adhere to the Department's policy governing off-duty arrests as outlined in ~~G.O.-601.2~~. CPD Policy ~~41.3.9~~.
- B. While operating a THV within the city limits, officers will monitor the police radio and advise dispatch when responding to a call.
- C. While in the City, off-duty officers operating THV will take appropriate action on incidents or calls for service which come to their attention either on-view, through a citizen, or radio monitored activity of a serious nature occurring within reasonable proximity to their location. They are expected to assist as necessary at the direction of the on-duty supervisor.
- D. Minor incidents encountered in the City while operating a THV off-duty may be handled and cleared by the off-duty officers. Dispatch must be notified. (Examples include alarms, disabled vehicles, traffic complaints.)

- E. Officers with civilian passenger(s) will not become involved in high-risk activities until the passenger(s) have been discharged at a safe location. Dispatch will be advised of the location where passengers are discharged so they may arrange transportation.
- F. Officers, off-duty, operating a THV in non-uniform clothing will only make traffic stops in the city when inaction would result in substantial public danger and/or reflect unfavorably upon the department. (Ex. Suspected DWI, Hit & Run and acts of negligent or reckless driving in full view of the officer and the public.)
- G. A THV will not be used to carry excessively large or heavy loads or objects which protrude from the trunk or windows, except in performance of official duties.
- H. Officers will adhere to all Maryland motor vehicle traffic laws and parking regulations.
- I. For deterrent reasons, when reasonable and safe, the THV shall be parked in plain view of the public.

7) Compensation:

- A. The off-duty use of a THV has sufficient value to preclude off-duty officers from being compensated further for providing assistance in routine situations for short periods of time (less than one hour).
- B. When the on-duty supervisor requests the off-duty officer's presence for longer than one hour, the officer will qualify for compensation at the rate of time and one-half for the actual time worked.

8) Off-Duty Involvement (Outside the City):

- A. Officers shall know and understand the limits and scope of their authority and only take enforcement action in those situations enumerated in the Annotated Code of Maryland and as outlined in CPDPolicy41.3.8.5.
- B. Except in incidents immediately affecting public safety, officers will not make traffic stops outside the City while off-duty.

9) Maintenance and Authorized Equipment:

- A. Officers are responsible for the maintenance of their assigned vehicle and will keep all scheduled appointments for service, factory recalls, etc.
- B. City vehicles will be kept clean. Trash will be properly disposed of and not subject to public view.
- C. The use of all tobacco products in a ~~city vehicle~~ THV is prohibited.
- D. Any addition or modification to vehicle equipment will require the advance approval of the Fleet Maintenance supervisor.
- E. No bumper sticker, decal, banner or placard of any type may be attached to a THV without permission of the Chief of Police.

10) Suspension or Termination from THV Program:

- A. Any violation of the above policy can be considered by the Chief of Police as cause to suspend or terminate the officer's THV privilege.

Per our telephone discussion, we are pleased to submit herein our proposal to provide engineering services to conduct an alternative study to replace Bridge No. A-C-07 on Washington Street over CSXT Railroad.

Description:

Bridge No. A-C-07 is a single-span, 42'-10" long steel beam bridge. The bridge was built in 1930. The portion of the superstructure which is intended to carry vehicular traffic consists of eleven steel beams which support a timber deck and an asphalt wearing surface. The clear roadway width is 27'-0" +/- and consists of two lanes. The 12'-10" wide timber sidewalks located on both sides of the bridge are supported by steel through-girders with a floor system comprised of steel floor beams and timber stringers. The substructure consists of two stone masonry abutments with wingwalls. Portions of the substructure have been covered with concrete or pneumatically applied mortar. Steel columns near the ends of the abutments support the through-girders and sidewalk. There is no traffic barrier along the approach roadways. Bridge No. A-C-07 is currently closed due to deterioration. The last inspection of the structure noted it was in overall 'imminent failure' condition and was previously posted at 8,000 lbs for Single Unit Vehicles and 8,000 lbs for Combination Vehicles. It was being inspected on a 1-year cycle at the time of the closure. The last recorded BSR of this structure was 33.0 and the bridge is classified as Structurally Deficient. The clearance between the bridge superstructure and the railroad tracks beneath the structure is approximately 18'-1" according to the bridge inspection report.

In discussions with Mr. Smith, it was decided a 21'-9" clearance (between the CSXT tracks and the underside of the structure) is to be considered for the replacement structure. The proposed bridge width will be reduced to a 38'-10" width. This will include a clear roadway width of 24'-10" as requested by the City of Cumberland (assumed two 10'-0" lanes with 2'-5" shoulders, 2'-0" wide concrete parapets, and a 5'-0" wide sidewalk on each side of the bridge).

Due to the steep vertical roadway profile on the approaches to the bridge, increasing the clearance for this bridge may require the use of retaining walls on the approaches. A preliminary investigation of retaining wall heights and lengths will be included with this study.

1. Review existing as-built plans and current bridge condition inspection report.
