III. Unfinished Business

(A) Ordinances

1. Ordinance (*2nd and 3rd readings*) - approving Zoning Text Amendment No. 1206 to amend the Use Regulations Table in Section 6.02 of the Zoning Ordinance to allow general restaurants and fast food restaurants without drive-thru service as permitted uses in the Residential-Office (R-O) Zone and allowing fast food restaurants with drive-thru services as conditional uses in the Residential-Office (R-O) Zone

SECOND READING: Mr. Rhodes provided background on the Ordinance. The Ordinance was then presented in title only. The reading was interrupted and motion to suspend the second reading and proceed to the third after comment was made by Caporale, seconded by Frazier, and passed on a vote of 5-0.

Kenneth Wilmot, 513 Fort Avenue, questioned whether fast food restaurants would be allowed in any residential area and Mr. Rhodes advised that they would only be allowed in residential/office districts. With no further comments, the Ordinance proceeded to its third reading.

THIRD READING: The Ordinance was presented in title only and was passed on a vote of 5-0.

Motion to approve the Resolution was made by Bernard, seconded by Caporale, and passed on a vote of 4-0 with Frazier abstaining from vote due to his position on the Western Maryland Scenic Railroad Board.

V. Public Comments

Kenneth Wilmot, 513 Fort Avenue, discussed concerns with the Washington Street bridge. He stated he did not like the bridge design that was proposed in the paper and felt the design

needed to conform to the historic code. Mr. Rhodes advised that infrastructure did not have to comply with historic code. Wilmot suggested making the bridge one way, putting in another steel bridge, and salvaging the steel from the old bridge.

Terry Murphy, 412 and 706 Washington Street, discussed concerns regarding the closure of the Washington Street bridge. He stated he and several others in attendance felt the matter was urgent as it concerned a primary street, and needed to know what was being done to resolve the problem. Mayor Grim discussed that the City did not believe the bridge belonged to the City and the burden was instead that of CSX's, but there had been meetings with CSX, State and Federal representatives, and other local partners seeking solutions and collaboration. He stated the City felt there should be three bridges on the West Side and they needed to be vehicular not just pedestrian. He advised there was the possibility of obtaining federal funds to help with the repairs if the City were to take ownership of the bridge, but that also meant the City would be strapped with maintenance indefinitely. Mr. Rhodes advised that staff was trying to arrange a meeting for the following week with CSX.

All public comments are limited to 5 minutes per person

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF CUMBERLAND, ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE USE REGULATIONS TABLE IN SECTION 6.02 OF THE CITY OF CUMBERLAND ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF ALLOWING GENERAL RESTAURANTS AND FAST FOOD RESTAURANTS WITHOUT DRIVE-THRU SERVICE AS PERMITTED USES IN THE RESIDENTIAL-OFFICE (R-O) ZONING DISTRICT AND ALLOWING FAST FOOD RESTAURANTS WITH DRIVE-THRU SERVICE AS CONDITIONAL USES IN SAID ZONING DISTRICT."

WHEREAS, Title 4, Subtitle 2 of the Land Use Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland grants the Mayor and City Council the power to enact a zoning ordinance, to amend it from time to time, and to provide for its administration and enforcement.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council deem it necessary to amend the City of Cumberland Zoning Ordinance from time to time for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, and/or general welfare of the City.

WHEREAS, in reviewing the use regulations applicable to the Residential-Office (R-O) Zoning District, City staff observed that restaurants are not permitted;

WHEREAS, Section 5.01.05 of the Zoning Ordinance provides that the purpose of the R-O District "is to provide areas appropriate for the harmonious mixing of residential and non-residential uses, and to provide for higher density residential development in a variety of housing types."

WHEREAS, staff proposed allowing restaurant uses in this district as they are appropriate uses in higher density residential areas which conveniently serve the needs of persons residing therein and are consistent with the other uses permitted therein;

WHEREAS, the City of Cumberland Municipal Planning and Zoning Commission held a public hearing on the subject matter of this ordinance on the 16th day of October, 2017, and determined that it should recommend that the Mayor and City Council pass an ordinance adopting the amendments to the City of Cumberland Zoning Ordinance which were proposed by staff.

WHEREAS, notice of the time and place of the hearing was published in the Cumberland Times-News, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cumberland, once each week for two successive weeks (on October 5, 2017 and October 12, 2017), the

first such notice having been published at least 14 days prior to the hearing, as required by Section 15.04.02 of the Zoning Ordinance.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council held a public hearing regarding the subject matter of this Ordinance on December 5, 2017, having published notice of the time and place of the hearing together with a summary this Ordinance in the Cumberland Times-News, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cumberland, once each week for two successive weeks (on November 20, 2017 and November 27, 2017), the first such notice having been published at least 14 days prior to the hearing, as required by Section 4-203(b) of the Land Use Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland.

WHEREAS, consistent with the recommendation of the Municipal Planning and Zoning Commission, the Mayor and City Council have determined that they should approve the proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE:

SECTION 1: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF CUMBERLAND, that the Use Regulations Table set forth in Section 6.02 of the City of Cumberland Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended as follows¹:

Re: Agreement for Legal Services

Dear Mr. Cohen:

I am writing to confirm our prior discussions about our firm providing advice and counsel to the City of Cumberland (the "City") with respect to issues that have arisen with CSX Transportation, Inc. ("CSX"). The work we discussed could include (but is not limited to) advice to the City about the federal legal issues presented by the dispute over repair of the bridges over Washington, Fayette and Cumberland Streets and CSX's continued operation in the City.

1. *Client; Scope of Representation.* The City is our client. We will represent the City upon request in any consultations, negotiations, litigation (including federal regulatory agency proceedings) or other tasks as assigned that may arise, as requested, in connection with the dispute over the repair of the bridges and CSX's continued operation in the City (the "Matter").

2. *Staffing.* I will be the primary contact with the City for handling matters on the City's behalf, and will call upon my partners W. Eric Pilsk and Allison Fultz, as well as the firm's associates, for assistance as required. Please note that although we have a substantial roster of attorneys who have experience in these matters, we will follow the Firm's practice of staffing matters leanly but in a way that ensures that we have lawyers available who are familiar with the issues and status of a matter as it develops and can respond quickly to developments as they arise. To that end, I will be the primary counsel at the outset and will advise you if and when it becomes necessary to call upon other attorneys (either partners or associates) to work on the Matter.

3. *Fees and Expenses.* Our fees are based primarily on the time spent by attorneys and paralegals devoting time to the City matters. We will bill you at the following hourly rates for the attorneys listed in paragraph 2, above: Mr. Spitulnik - \$525; Mr. Pilsk and Ms. Fultz - \$495. In addition all associates who might be called upon to work on this matter will be billed at

the rate of \$325. As explained previously, if necessary, we may call upon other lawyers at the Firm as well, and will advise you of their involvement and their billing rate at the time that they begin to work on the Matter. Time devoted by paralegals and law clerks is currently charged at the rate of \$140 per hour. These billing rates will increase by 3% per year, beginning on January 1, 2019, and increasing again on January 1 by the same percentage each year thereafter.

We will charge for any expenses we incur in connection with the City matters in addition to the amount of our fees for legal services. Reimbursable expenses include but are not limited to charges for photocopying at \$.10 per page for black and white copying and \$.20 for color copying, and for messenger and delivery service, travel, computerized legal research, long-distance telephone and fax, court reporting services and administrative agency and/or court filing fees at their actual cost. If we need to retain other professionals (such as expert witnesses or local counsel), we will secure your permission first. Their fees and expenses will generally not be paid by us, but will be billed directly to you.

As you know, the fees and expenses relating to litigation are difficult to predict. Payment of the Firm's fees and expenses is in no way contingent on the ultimate outcome of any of the City matters to which we devote attention.

Each of our bills will include detailed information concerning time expended and services performed by the attorneys and paralegals whose work is included in the bill and any disbursements for which reimbursement is sought. It is the Firm's practice to send our clients a consolidated monthly invoice showing the amounts billed for particular matters during the period covered by the invoice. Unless a client requests otherwise, our invoice contains daily detail for each lawyer's work on the client's matter. We can, however, prepare that invoice in any format that meets your needs. We urge you to raise any questions regarding our invoices as soon as they arise so that we can resolve any problems promptly. We require that the City pay our fees promptly on a monthly basis. We consider any invoice more than 30 days old to be overdue.

4. *Representations as to Success.* Either at the commencement or during the course of our representation, we may express opinions or beliefs concerning the outcome of any aspect of our representation or various courses of action and the results that might be anticipated. While we will always endeavor to give you a candid and accurate assessment of the City's matters, any such statements will be an expression of our opinion based on information available to us at the time, and not a promise or guarantee.

5. *Conflicts.* As you know, the Firm represents many other companies, state and local governments (including transportation agencies) and individuals. It is possible that, during the time that we are working on the Matter, some of our present or future clients may have disputes or transactions with you. You acknowledge that our representation of the City does not prevent us from representing other clients adverse to the City as long as their disputes with the

City do not involve a matter on which we are working for the City or any confidential information received from the City in connection with any such matter.

6. *Terms of Representation.* The terms of this agreement for legal services in connection with the Matter are effective as of November 1, 2017. We reserve the right to withdraw from our representation if, among other things, you fail to honor the terms of the engagement letter, you fail to cooperate or follow our advice on a material matter, or any fact or circumstance (including any conflict of interest with another client) would, in our view, render our continuing representation unlawful or unethical. If we elect to withdraw, you will take all steps necessary to free us of any obligation to perform further, including the execution of any documents necessary to complete our withdrawal. No termination of our representation by the City or the Firm shall relieve the City of its obligations under the terms of our engagement to pay for costs or expenses paid or incurred on your behalf. In the unusual event that a court of competent jurisdiction refuses to permit us to withdraw upon termination, you would remain responsible for costs. In the event we are compelled to intervene in a pending lawsuit or initiate any proceeding in order to recover any amount due under the terms of our engagement, you agree to pay any and all attorneys' fees, court costs and/or other expenses incurred by us to recover such amounts due us pursuant to the terms of our engagement.

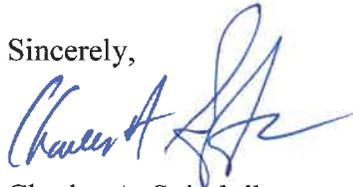

Our engagement letter may only be amended in writing by the parties hereto.

Following a staff recommendation to improve signage and usage in the Center City Parking Garage, a portion of the improvements can be undertaken using the Community Legacy-funded Central Business District Façade Improvement Program. Staff recommends that the maximum award of \$10,000.00 be allocated toward these initial stages of the project. The following estimates have been received from the contractors listed for the exterior work:

- Fischer Signs – 4 new entrance/exit signs and 36” round perpendicular symbol - \$2240.00
 - Hoyman Painting – Pressure wash the exterior concrete structure - \$3627.00
 - Hoyman Painting – Replace stairwell lexan glass/install tempered glass - \$4,599.00
- Total \$10,466.00

The remaining \$466.00 will be paid by the Downtown Development Commission. An order to approve the allocation of the Community Legacy grant funding by the Mayor and City Council is needed.
